What advice would you give to FFA members?

However, you need to push yourself, just like an athlete does in a race, to go beyond your comfort level. It doesn't have to be all at once; you can be the chapter sentinel, then chapter president, then a state officer and be more and more confident along the way. Don't sit in the audience and say 'I could never do that;' rather, take it one step at a time and before you know it, you will be that person on stage!”
